Dear Friends,

I'd like to use this opportunity to say a word of thanks to those who participated in the Annual Congregational Meeting on January 29th. As we tried to make the date known so that you could plan ahead we used this phrase: "Annual Meeting-Where the Rubber of Ministry Meets the Road of Reality." By reality, of course, we were referring to things like electing church officers and other leaders, approving the annual budget and hearing of the work of various committees and organizations over the past year. Equally important were some of the things shared about our future.

We are a vibrant church. The "Friends in Faith" band from Edwards United Church of Christ, Davenport led us in worship on the 29<sup>th</sup> and helped us realize that there are many ways to offer our worship of prayer and praise. It was wonderful having them join us and we are grateful that they make the trip periodically to share their gift of music and allow us to become their "Friends in Faith," too.

I took the opportunity at the annual meeting to share some information about a trend we will be spending some time with this year, looking at our organizational structure and methods of communication. I hope that you have been enjoying the new DeWitt UCC E-NEWS. We realize that the printed monthly Carillon Notes newsletter plays an important role in our church, but more and more people are getting their information digitally and that someday soon this monthly mailing might very well no longer be published. If you have not yet provided us with your email address please do so if you wish to receive important church information. As more and more activities and people bless our church we will also want to pay close attention to how we "talk" with one another. Please think of the church office as the "central hub" for sharing news and information. We will be releasing a new method of garnering your feedback in a few days through an on-line survey. This will be an easy survey to complete. It's only some 15 questions long and will be available on the website for one month. If you know of someone who won't be able to do the survey on line and they would like to be sure to participate, let us know so we can make it available to them on Sunday morning or Wednesday evening here at church. We will have a computer kiosk available along with someone to help them. We can also arrange for someone to visit them in their home, if they wish, to help answer any questions they might have. Watch for more information.

Whenever change occurs there's always a short period time when we must "get used to" the new format. I would like to assure you that no one will be left out. We will meet the needs of every active church member in new and unique ways.

I was also very proud of our church for two other reasons during last Sunday's meeting. Holle Maricle, Director of Religious Education, shared news of our new "Safe Church" initiative. Once the policy is finalized within the next few weeks and we're underway with the program, we as church members, our children and their parents can know that the safety of the children in our church is a top priority. For most people following the policy guidelines will be pro forma, meaning that many in our church have wondered why we haven't had it in place yet. We know the time has come for us to be open and intentional about looking after the safety of the children who come to church. This is a very good step forward. Participating in education, training and background disclosures is never a simple process. But as we've seen happen, churches are not immune from the possibility of child physical or sexual abuse. We care about our children and are committed to doing everything possible to keep them safe.

Lastly, I'd like to thank you for recommitting our church to the long standing relationship shared with United Manor, a HUD managed senior housing project. Even though our involvement is indirect, meaning that we have two members of our church on its board of directors, our name and "substance" if you will, come right along with them. Here is one great example of how we are participating in mission within our community. Yes, we travel to Jamaica and Kentucky for mission work too, but we will never forget to be present to the needs of our own community as best we are able.

Please watch for the weekly E-NEWS to arrive in your inbox every Wednesday afternoon and share that information with anyone you know who might not have email access at this time.

May God richly bless us in our ministries and may our work as a church be so real that we can feel the rubber meeting the road. Let's continue to walk the talk.

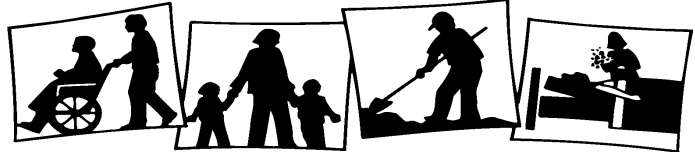

## **Outreach and Evangelism**

### **ACTS · OF · FAITH** by Jan Rittmer

I'm thinking about rich people today. I follow politics in the belief that the political happenings in our country – maddening as they are – are important. After watching a debate or two and the President's State of the Union Speech, know that wealth, private and corporate, is going to be heavily discussed in the upcoming campaign. I fear we are *all* going to be thinking about rich people from now through November.

"Rich" is a relative term, but I think we can agree that by most of our standards *no* "poor" people are running for President in 2012. I've must confess that I nurse a sort of reverse snobbery against wealthy people. I don't know why, but I always have, and I know I'm not the only one. This unreasonable generalization is one of the things that made me cynical about politics. I'm not very proud of that. Cynicism is never a fully thought out position, and egotistical as I am, I think I should be smarter than to base my actions solely on it. I plan to chip away at my wealth-related political cynicism between now and Election Day. There must be a better way to pick my candidate than because he's *poorer* than the rest of them!

Roger and I do not have lots of money, and mostly we don't care. We are warm, over-fed, and have access to health care. We consider money as a tool to be used as needed. We have some money left for discretionary use, which we spend in ways that seem important to us. Some of our money is used to help other people because that's one of our priorities. By world standards we are rich. I wonder how we would feel about being judged for the size of our "fortune". First, we'd feel it's nobody's business how much money we have or don't have as long as we've earned it honestly and not by taking advantage of others. We judge *ourselves* by what we spend money *for*. Although I doubt any of you even consider the Rittmer's finances, as we're not running for office, if you do, and want to examine our priorities, you are welcome to do so. I believe our financial priorities say something positive about us.

I've known a few moderately wealthy people. At least one of them, although likeable, took pride in being part of the world's problems. This election year I must remind myself that many wealthy folks try hard to be part of the solutions.

I think of Bill and Melinda Gates and Warren Buffet. Bill Gates of Microsoft fame and his wife, Melinda, formed a foundation in 1994 with a gift of 94 million dollars. Now the fund is up to more than 26 *billion* dollars. They allocate fund money according to their interests and passions. Look at the Gates' spending priorities: World wide, the primary aims of the foundation are to enhance healthcare and reduce extreme poverty, and in America, the fund expands educational opportunities and access to information technology. By 2009 the Gates fund had donated \$33.5 billion to their "passions". In 2009, Warren Buffett, one of the world's richest men, heavily endowed the Bill and Melinda Gates fund because he shared their goals and they applied good business practices in administrating the money. Buffett donates 99% of his personal income to charity. It's hard to remain cynical about these amazingly wealthy philanthropists. Once again, the size of the wealth takes a back seat to the priorities of the giver.

Will a candidate's wealth help me decide how to vote? Probably. Most of us count on our biases to help us pick candidates. But my bias will rule over my cynicism. I'll ask which candidate is most likely to be both appropriately frugal and compassionately giving with our country's money? In short, which candidate has priorities that most closely match the Rittmer family?

The One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) Offering, administered by Wider Church Ministries, Global Sharing of Resources, provides support to health, education, refugee, agricultural, and emergency relief initiatives in 138 countries, by working with local, national, and international partners. The offering is received most often during Lent, with the fourth Sunday suggested as the Dedication Day.

The 2012 OGHS theme continues from last year's theme, "Sharing Bring Joy, but adds the focus of bringing joy to Others."

Our first thoughts about how our gifts bring joy to others most likely focus on the tangible results of our sharing:

- ◆ A family displaced by natural disaster or political unrest is grateful to receive food, shelter, and the comfort of a safe place to begin to rebuild their lives
- ◆ Anyone who had to walk miles to get water for their family, smiles as a well is dug in their community, bringing clean water within reach
- ◆ A farmer whose harvest succumbed to the storms, is thankful when offered food, water, and new seed, helping her to make it through to the next harvest

Of course, when we "sow bountifully" by giving to others, we reap bountifully by sharing in the joy that our gifts bring to those whose basic needs are met.

But in Paul's second letter to the Corinthians, he reminds us of another way our giving brings joy to others. In encouraging the Corinthian church to give to the collection for the believers in Jerusalem, he reminds them that when the Jewish believers receive gifts from their non-Jewish sisters and brothers, they will be moved by the gifts themselves, and by the unity in Christ the gifts represent.

Knowing there are those who would share willingly with them, they are reminded of who they are: beloved children of the Creator, each one a person of sacred worth.

Across social and economic lines that should have separated them, followers of Christ reached out to support one another. The awareness of another's need allowed them to recognize their own abundance as a gift from God, one they were called to share.

This year, as you make your offering to One Great Hour of Sharing, remember the joy your gifts offers others, is hope. Sow bountifully and share abundantly, knowing that your are not only helping change the statistics, you are helping change lives. Please give generously!
